Brittini Chicuata



native daughter of San Francisco's Fillmore District is sparking change across the city. Brittni Chicuata (she/her) serves as Director of Economic Rights at the San Francisco Human Rights Commission. In this role, she fights for economic justice policy advancement and leads with strategic vision through an anti-racism, anti-discrimination, and accessibility approach. Brittni is a lifelong anti-poverty advocate, with a particular fire in her belly for reproductive justice and security. Brittni has worked as a policymaker in public health, cannabis, criminal justice, food access, and birth justice over the last decade, co-writing and co-leading successful campaigns with tangible impact locally and nationally.

In 2022, Brittni served as campaign manager for Malia Cohen, helping to elect the first Black woman as State Controller in California history. Brittni is focused on helping realize the social and health needs of the most vulnerable communities and currently does that by expanding the work of government to make radical investments towards a more equitable San Francisco.

Ryan Coogler

Spike Lee recently said, "After I retire, I'm passing the torch to Ryan Coogler .Ryan Kyle Coogler is an African-American filmmaker from Oakland, California. He is known for directing the Black Panther film series, Creed, a Rocky spin-off and Fruitvale Station. He frequently casts Michael B. Jordan in his works. He also produced the Creed seguels, Judas and the Black Messiah and Space Jam: A New Legacy.

Mr. Coogler attended nearby Saint Mary's College on a football scholarship, then transferred to Sacramento State College. Later he was a graduate student in the University of Southern California School of Cinematic Arts. He eventually met and partnered with Oscar-winning actor Forest Whitaker who agreed to develop and produce his first feature-film project, Fruitvale Station (2013). The story is about the last 24 hours of the life of Oscar Grant (played by Michael B. Jordan), who was

shot to death by a police officer at Oakland's Fruitvale BART station on January 1, 2009. Produced by Oscar-winning actor Forest Whitaker, the film premiered at the 2013 Sundance Film Festival, where it won the top Audience Award and Grand Jury Prize in the dramatic competition and was released in theatres on July 20, 2013. Made on a budget of \$900,000, the film grossed over \$17 million worldwide after its theatrical run

In 2015, Coogler released his second film, Creed, a spin-off of the Rocky films, which Coogler directed and co-wrote with Aaron Covington. The film starred Michael B. Jordan as Apollo Creed's son Donnie, who is trained and mentored by his father's old friend and former rival Rocky Balboa, played by Sylvester Stallone. It received critical acclaim from critics and audiences and grossed over \$173 million worldwide. Among its accolades, Stallone won the National Board of Review Award for Best Supporting Actor, the Critics' Choice Movie Award for Best Supporting Actor, and Golden Globe Award for Best Supporting Actor.

In 2018, Coogler co-wrote and directed the Marvel film Black Panther, making him the first black Marvel Studios director. The film starred Chadwick Boseman as the titular character, who is crowned king of Wakanda following his father's death, but is challenged by his cousin, Erik Killmonger (played by Michael B. Jordan), who plans to abandon the country's isolationist policies and begin a global revolution.


Upon release, the film grossed \$1.3 billion worldwide and broke numerous box office records, becoming the highest-grossing film directed by a Black filmmaker, the ninth-highest-grossing film of all time and the second-highest-grossing film of 2018. Black Panther was also a critical success. Rotten Tomatoes' critical consensus reads, "Black Panther elevates superhero cinema to thrilling new heights while telling one of the MCU's most absorbing stories—and introducing some of its most fully realized characters. The film was also noted for its representation of black people and subject matter related to Afrofuturism. The film was nominated for seven awards at the 91st Academy Awards, winning three, and received numerous other accolades. Black Panther is the first superhero film to receive an Academy Award nomination for Best Picture, and the first MCU film to win several categories (those being for Best Costume Design, Best Production Design and Best Original Score).

Coogler served as co-writer and director on the Black Panther sequel, Black Panther: Wakanda Forever, which was released in the United States on November 11, 2022. The film has grossed over \$800 million dollars.

In 2021, she launched a podcast called The MetaSpiritualist, which focuses on spiritual and religious discussions, guided meditations, affirmations, and sound healing. The nonjudgmental platform reaches people who want to spread faith and hope throughout the world by sharing their experiences. She is currently working on a political podcast for Black/African American members of government and public affairs. Her leadership helped to pass historic first-in-the-nation legislation that extended employment leave for all survivors of violence, as well as legislation permitting crime victims to terminate their leases if they no longer feel safe in their homes following a crime. Tinisch also played a pivotal leadership role in the defeat of Proposition 20, a regressive ballot measure on the 2020 California ballot that sought to repeal numerous successful criminal justice reforms.

She has been deeply engaged in the Bay Area social justice movement as the community organizer, policy advocate and systems navigator for nearly two decades. Tinisch has worked passionately to bring the voices of survivors to the center of community engagement and public policy and has advocated tirelessly for those voices to guide decisions, priorities, and resources. Prior to joining CSJ in 2019, Tinisch served in various leadership capacities in local government, including at the San Francisco Human Services Agency and in the San Francisco Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice.







Shakirah Simley




Maya Angelou once said, "there is no greater agony than bearing an untold story inside you." Luckily, educator Dante King isn't afraid to share his stories with the world. He is a native of San Francisco, and the author of the new book The 400-Year Holocaust: White America's Legal, Psychopathic, and Sociopathic Black Genocide and the Revolt Against Critical Race Theory. Dante is also a professor of American History, African American History, and Black Studies. His research interests include the intersections of race, racism, and legality throughout pre-and-post colonial America. Dante currently serves as guest faculty at the University of California, San Francisco, School of Medicine (UCSF), as well as the Mayo Clinic. Dante is a historian, scholar, public motivational speaker, thought-leader, facilitator, and coach.

Dante has worked and consulted for more than 15-years as a human resource management professional specializing in the implementation of anti-racist practice, and organizational development and change.

In 2018, Dante partnered with the San Francisco Board of Supervisors to develop and enact the City and County of San Francisco's Racial Equity Ordinance, which led to the first-ever citywide Office of Racial Equity (2019).


Monique Guidry

Arieann **Harrison**

rieann Harrison is following in her late mother's footsteps. A woman on a mission with no means to quit. Arieann is the Founder of The Marie Harrison Community Foundation, Inc, for social and environmental justice in San Francisco's District 10, Bay View/Hunters Point area, the 2nd largest Super-Fund in the United States.

Marie Harrison, Arieann's mother, worked at the former Hunters Point Naval Shipyard, where a radiological defense laboratory operated from 1946 to 1969. Marie served as one of the first environmental justice managers who spearheaded the campaign to shut down the Pacific Gas & Electric plant back in the 1970's. Her efforts lead to an investigation into the Hunters Point Naval Shipyard radioactive contamination and cover-up. In her later years, Marie would attend press conferences with an oxygen tank in tow to fight for District 10. Marie fought for D-10 until she lost her battle with pulmonary disease in 2019.

Marie Harrison's untimely death sparked a fire inside of Arieann. Pulmonary disease typically came from smoking, but Arieann knew her mother never picked up a cigarette in her life. This convinced Arieann that she and other Bayview Hunters Point residents were exposed and harmed by toxic chemicals coming from the shipyard.

Arieann is now making a difference in District 10. Harrison, like her in the community to help educate residents about the toxic environ-from high rates of cancer and respiratory illness' caused by over district. Marie Harrison Community Foundation Inc was founded by Arieann back in 2020. As executive director, Arieann works with community partners and government agencies to deliver services to program participants. Most recently, with the help of community partners and support from Bay Area Air Quality Management (BAAQMD), Arieann successfully self-nominated the Bayview/ Hunters Point community for California Assembly Bill (AB)617 status requiring the California Resource Board (CARB) to reduce air emissions in partnership with the community.


Arieann works at the intersection of public health, environmental justice/racism, and climate change—focusing on making the connections between historical practices and current conditions. She uses both her toxicology background and her legal training to address environmental issues. Her areas of expertise include environmental justice, policy, partnership development, public health, facilitation, education, organizational enhancement, climate change, data analysis, and toxicology. She is particularly interested in the application of the Clean Air Act, the National Environmental Policy Act, and the Clean Water Act, and how populations have been disproportionately harmed under the misuse of these laws.

Harrison is a 54-year-old mother and grandmother who's lived and worked her whole life in Bayview Hunters Point. She graduated from School of the Arts and attended City College of San Francisco.

Jameel Patterson

Jameel Patterson has been in social services for 30 years. He was inspired by his mother, Barbara Patterson, who fed and ministered to the homeless for 20 years. She would bring Jameel with her when she prepared the food on Saturday and served it later in the evening. This made Jameel grow socially on a variety of levels. He would conversate with community members and homeless volunteers on a regular basis.

Jameel would meet business officials whom his mother established relationships with and consistently donated food to. This served as Jameel's weekend for 7 years.



Today, Jameel continues to work with the homeless. He's been working in the field for 10 years as a counselor. He has helped people get SSI, welfare, housing, medical and immigration status.

His first official job was with the Coleman Advocates Youth group called YMAC. The organization paid their youth workers and trained them to become community advocates. This gave Jameel experience in the progressive and liberal world of politics. A few of YMAC's alumni currently work at city hall and some have even become politicians. While at YMAC, Jameel worked on drafting legislation, community rallies, workshops, public speaking, and outreach. He also drafted criteria for the first youth commission selection, created a youth line, and helped establish the first youth vote. He also organized rallies against police brutality alongside CNN political commentor Van Jones.

Jameel graduated high school, but never finished city college. However, while he was in college he studied administration of justice, political science and theology.

He became a peer counselor for students and worked for a student-run mentorship program that guided students on what courses suited them.

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Fathina Holmes

Fathina Holmes represents "The Ground Movement" in San Francisco, where she lives and works actively with her community. Ms. Holmes can be seen marching around the city pounding the pavement and providing her neighbors with access to career and job opportunities.

Fathina Holmes is a San Francisco native who has committed her life to serving disadvantaged communities of color, the reentry population, women in the construction trades, and to provide ongoing empowerment and support in workforce development.

For over 20 years, Fathina has worked with disadvantaged communities in career training, mentorship, case management, intake and retention efforts. She serves in a lead role at the Office of Economic and Workforce Development on construction training and placement efforts on high priority, impact projects throughout San Francisco. She works closely with the contractors and stakeholders on construction projects to ensure fair and equitable job opportunities and career advancement in the trades for Bayview residents and San Francisco at large.

Fathina also leads several re-entry efforts including her work within jail facilities, where she provides workforce training and brokers job opportunities for the Interrupt Predict and Organize (IPO) reentry program, and other jail initiatives. Before OEWD, Fathina worked for Young Community Developers, Inc. providing job placement and retention support for District 10 residents.

Fathina has received numerous published and unpublished accolades for the impact work she does. In 2018, she was honored and received a Phenomenal Woman in Career Development award from the A. Philip Randolph Institute. She has also received various awards and recognitions from the City and County of San Francisco and the California legislature who recognized her contribution to workforce as well to meaningful change in the Southeast and similarly situated communities.

In 2005, Fathina, as a member of the San Francisco Public Utilities Community Benefits Committee, helped create the Southeast workforce plan for the construction work currently taking place in the Southeast. Fathina currently sits on Mayor London Breed's pre-apprenticeship committee.

In the fall of 2008, he was guest lecturer at the University of Berkeley where he focused on the plight and progression of the Church in America.





During the social and economic upheavals of the 1960s, her parents migrated to California, and when Watts was destroyed following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, they moved again, landing in the Bay Area, where her father attended the UCSF Dental School.

During high school, Cheryl received an internship from the SF Department of Public Health to work in the City's Bayview District, where residents have been historically subjected to inadequate or outright lack of healthcare support. Her earlier exposure to Black disenfranchisement and a predilection for activism enabled her to connect the dots between housing, healthcare, and education, as pivotal to the emancipation of San Francisco's Black communities. Therefore, her resolve to develop communities focuses on youth.

Over the years, local activists such as Art Agnos, Enola Maxwell, and Espanola Jackson pushed tirelessly for comprehensive healthcare services to the City's Southeast sector. Yet, as access improved through

various Federal, State, and local legislation, the disparity in healthcare provision remains a poignant reality in this part of San Francisco.

Cheryl remains optimistic about the impact of her continuing activism as the Vice President of the Community Health Chapter for SEIU 1021, Cope delegate for political action, and the local NAACP's Youth Council leader. In her role, she advocates on behalf of

voter registration and redistricting awareness, particularly in District 10. Her recognition in the 2022 publication of Sun Reporter's 2022 Talented 25 Special Edition --is a well-deserved honor for which she is most grateful.

Cheryl continues to advocate for racial equity and the full inclusion of Black perspectives in political processes. Recently, she led a community-rooted effort to provide public comment to the City of San Francisco's Redistricting process that led to keeping historic Black neighborhoods such as Potrero Hill, Bayview, and Sunnydale together to protect Black political representation in city government.
